July Training Director's Report

You would think that news items would slow down in the heat of summer at K-9, but there is always something to report, inform and request you, the members, about!!

First, a request about the ring gates. All of K-9 property and equipment, including ring gates, is for our members to use at their convenience with one stipulation: If you rearrange ring gates for a specific training session (and members are welcome to do so), please return the ring gates to their original ring and arrangement. This is especially important for Ring A with the sectioned off cubicles in which many full to capacity STAR Puppy and Family Dog classes are held ongoing and year-round. Rearranging the gates is time consuming and tiring for a single instructor who then will instruct full classes, often back-to-back--and may have to blow the rings free of debris as well. Putting gates back in a "classroom-ready" arrangement is a great way to support the instructors who do so much for K-9!

Eight Ways to Keep Dogs Calm During Fireworks and Thunderstorms

Some easy-to-follow suggestions to lower stress levels when noise comes from the skies.

1. Don't Bring Dogs Outside When Fireworks Are Going Off

Don't take your dog to a fireworks show. Unfortunately, your neighbors might be having a show of their own. To keep dogs calm during fireworks, do evening routines ahead of time. Go for a walk (the longer, the better) before it gets dark. Feed your dog dinner before it becomes night. And take them out for their evening potty break after the fireworks end.

2. Make Them a Safe Space

Play it safe by putting their bed or crate somewhere that's quiet and away from windows. If you're going to crate, keep the door open. Your dog doesn't want to feel trapped. You also shouldn't lock them up in a room. A dog should feel free to decide where it's safe for them.

3. Fight Noise with Noise

Mozart to the rescue. Play music, turn on the TV or leave a fan on when thunder is booming and fireworks are exploding. These sounds can help drown out scary outdoor noises. Classical music seems to work best for keeping dogs calm during fireworks and thunderstorms.

4. Close the Curtains

A curtain call could help because flashing bright lights can be distressing to your dog. In addition to closing the curtains, you might also want to turn on a few more lights in the house. This could help minimize the scary effects of lightning or fireworks.

5. Escape-Proof Your Home and Yard

The quickest way to a dog's heart is through their stomach. So, this year, give your dog a gift that makes their tail wag in anticipation! From meat-flavored dog bones to dog-friendly Christmas cookies, your dog will be drooling over these holiday treats.

6. Ensure Your Dog Is Wearing a Pet ID Tag

Worst case scenario: your dog still found a way to escape when the fireworks or thunder started. Best case scenario: your dog was wearing their collar and ID tag. A reflective collar would be even better for any nighttime searches.

7. Use Calming Aids and Products

Help is on the way in the form of calming vitamins, supplements and CBD edibles. Calming diffusers, collars and sprays emit pheromones that take your dog back to their puppy days, helping them feel more relaxed. The gentle pressure of an anxiety jacket like a ThunderShirt mimics the comforting feeling of being swaddled in a blanket.

8. Talk with Your Dog's Veterinarian

A stress-reducing prescription medication may be just what the doctor ordered. Consulting with your veterinarian can help determine the best anxiety or calming medication for your pet's specific needs. They may also have some therapeutic options for your dog as well.

Something To Be Aware of!

A reprint from a Facebook post

"On Sunday night our dog Remi was bit or stung by something.. we sadly still don't know what.. she was vomiting and had hives. We did like most pet owners and gave her Benadryl.. .sadly she quickly turned for the worst. 2:45 in the morning we rushed her to the emergency clinic in Mishawaka. When she arrived her pupils were nonresponsive and she was experiencing tremors. They quickly rushed her away and got her hooked up to IV and on meds. Her glucose level when we arrived was only 36 and her liver and kidneys were compromised.

By 6 AM she had stabilized, but was not out of the woods. At 7:30 we had to transport her to another vet clinic. She spent the day there and was able to come home that evening

She is now recovering well at home and we are so thankful we did not lose her..

For three days I've been trying to figure out what went wrong and why she reacted to the Benadryl the way she did. With the help of Dr. Brown from Fedore Vet Clinic we realized the liquid gelcaps Benadryl that I gave her had ingredients that are toxic to dogs. You've all heard that people say artificial sweeteners are bad and are fatal for them, well the Benadryl allergy liquid gelcaps have this in them....

Please share so other owners are aware that the Benadryl allergy liquid gelcaps cannot be given to dogs!!!

Xylitol

A Common Artificial Sweetener Is Poisoning Dogs. Xylitol is an artificial sweetener found in everything from toothpaste to peanut butter to sugarfree gum. And, it turns out, it's poison for dogs. The FDA just dropped a new warning that, while it's just fine for people, the sweetener has proven fatal for dogs. It's found in gum, peanut butter, jams, pop AND Benadryl Gel Caps!! It's killing dogs but there are no warnings on labels.

It's up to the dog community to spread the word."



Janice Butler and Bella, Portuguese Water Dog, earned their first PWD specific title in early June at a nationally sanctioned water trial held in New Smyrna Beach, FL. Water trials and title levels are based on recreation of tasks performed by the breed when they were working dogs on fishing boats in Portugal. Team Bella earned the first title level, Apprentice Water Dog, which includes retrieving items under water, thrown at a distance, and dropped off a boat, as well as handler/dog exercises carrying items while under control, riding on a boat and a timed swim - think recall and heeling pattern while swimming. Our obedience training gave us a strong base for all of the water trial exercises.
